

Dickinson is a premier **four-year residential liberal-arts** institution chartered in **1783**, six days after the signing of the Treaty of Paris, making it the first college established in the newly formed United States of America. Founded by **Dr. Benjamin Rush**, signer of the Declaration of Independence, and named for John Dickinson, "penman of the Revolution" and signer of the U.S. Constitution, Dickinson is widely recognized as a leader in **global education**, **sustainability initiatives** and **civic engagement**.







The Figures

A college education is a significant investment. The lifetime value of the investment and the fit between a student and an institution are key considerations. We are committed to making a Dickinson education affordable, ensuring that all students have access to our dedicated faculty, nationally recognized educational opportunities, state-of-the-art facilities, varied co-curricular and extracurricular experiences and so much more.

In fact, all students admitted to the class of 2023 who filed complete, on-time applications had their financial **need met**—and that's an annual achievement, not a rarity. In 2018-19, financial support for students added up to \$60.3 million just from Dickinson.

Tuition for 2020-21 is \$56,498. Room and board is \$14,672.

TIMING IS EVERYTHING

Another way we make things easier is that students receive their financial aid packages at the time of acceptance-right there online (or for those who prefer to wait for the mail, in the same envelope). So when students are admitted to Dickinson, they and their family know right away what to expect in terms of aid and scholarships.

Merit **Scholarships**

As part of our commitment to recognizing superior talent and service, regardless of financial need, all applicants, based upon credentials, are considered for Dickinson's merit-based scholarships.

Campus, Facilities & Services

Our 350-acre campus includes six LEED-gold-certified buildings (plus a LEED-platinum residence hall and a commitment to pursuing LEED certification for all new projects), traditional and special-interest housing options and new state-of-the-art science, athletics and research facilities and a certified-organic College Farm. Dining options include gluten-free, kosher, organic, vegan, vegetarian and local fruits and vegetables from our farm.

Carlisle, Pa. Dickinson is in Carlisle, named a "most livable city" by *Forbes* and located minutes from the state capital of Harrisburg. The campus is connected to a vibrant downtown that offers eclectic dining, shopping and entertainment options. Carlisle is a two-hour drive from Baltimore, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C., and three hours from New York City.

Admissions Applicants are expected to have pursued a college-preparatory course of study, including substantial sequences in math, foreign languages and science. Interviews and campus visits are strongly recommended. Our acceptance rate is 40%. Partnerships Sharing its Carlisle location with other educational institutions, Dickinson has partnerships with the U.S. Army War College and Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute and the world-renowned Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet. In addition, top business, law, engineering and medical schools offer programs to accelerate admission for Dickinson graduates or give graduates credit for undergraduate courses. Agreements are in place with RPI, Columbia University and Johns Hopkins University Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, among others.

Awards Dickinson is a leading producer of Fulbright scholars and Peace Corps volunteers. Prestigious awards for postgraduate study include Rhodes, Udall, Goldwater, George J. Mitchell, Rotary Ambassadorial, Carnegie Junior Fellowship and Kathryn Wasserman Davis Projects for Peace.

Applying EARLY DECISION is

recommended for students who, through careful reflection and research, have identified Dickinson as their first choice. If this is you, consider applying by **Nov. 15** for Early Decision I or **Jan. 15** for Early Decision II.

FIRST-YEAR APPLICATION CHECKLIST

- □ A completed Common Application with nonrefundable \$65 fee (or fee waiver).
- Official secondary school transcript(s) listing all courses and grades, including senior year grades as soon as available.
- Counselor recommendation.
- □ Academic teacher recommendations (one required, two recommended).
- SAT 1 or ACT test results (submission is optional for all applicants; must be indicated on Common Application). Self-reported scores will be accepted with official score reports submitted after enrollment.
- Early Decision candidates must submit a signed Early Decision Agreement Form.
- □ Applicants for federal and state aid must file the FAFSA (available at www.fafsa.ed.gov) by the selected admission application deadline. Those who wish to be considered for Dickinson's need-based grant aid also must complete the CSS PROFILE (available at profileonline.collegeboard.org) by the same deadline. To be considered for all need-based aid available from Dickinson, BOTH forms need to be completed using information from the previous year's federal tax forms.
- □ If you plan to apply for need-based financial aid, please note that all information must be submitted by the selected deadline for an admission decision to be released.
- All international students must submit the Certification of Finances. Those applying for need-based aid must complete either the International Student Financial Aid Application (ISFAA) or CSS PROFILE (if applicable). Learn more at Dickinson.edu/internationaladmissions.
- Students who wish to submit supplementary music, art, dance or theatre materials (optional) must do so through SlideRoom as part of the Common Application.
